




Concussion Symptoms For Children May Change Over Time, Include Emotional Elements

In the May e-edition of the PT in Motion Magazine the hot topic of children's concussion comes to

the forefront again. The article reviews a series of findings which appear to support findings that chilcren with concussions have emotional changes long after physical symptoms of concussion have ceased. The article sites an e-publication in the May 12 issue of <u>Pediatrics</u> (abstract only available for free). The authors use the Rivermead instrument to look at cognitive, emotional and physical symptoms. These symptoms appear to show a variation in symptoms that do not decrease at the same pace.

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
